

Climate Action

Two Unexpected meetings held at our Meetinghouse This Summer

Our Climate Action Committee had no plans for summer climaterelated events at our Meetinghouse. That changed in June when we learned from Rev. Linda that a group of climate scientists were interested in using our Meetinghouse as part of their NH summer speaking tour. We accepted of course. On the 4th of August 31 people gathered from our Fellowship, the Plymouth UCC, and from the greater Plymouth community. The presenters included scientists from Harvard University, NYU, and Princeton University.

A series of slides were shown, beginning with the elements causing climate warming **as it exists at the present time** that represents settled scientific knowledge, and then distinguishing that from the impacts that are either somewhat uncertain or largely uncertain.

Increases in CO2 and average temperature, heat waves, and gradual sea level rise are all elements of existing climate warming that are considered **settled scientifically**. Less settled, at present, are the impacts of hurricanes, heavy rains, droughts, and wildfires. As to the impacts of ice sheet collapse and permafrost melting on rising temperatures, those are uncertain at present. It is also uncertain that heat waves contributing to climate warming are having an impact presently on ice sheet collapse and permafrost melting.

A key question toward the end of the presentation was what would happen to global temperatures if we stopped emitting CO2? The surprising answer is that temperatures would remain constant after that stoppage of emissions.

The presenters pointed out that even when people agree on the scientific consensus, they can still have differing views on what society *should do* about climate change. For example, should we prioritize adaptation or mitigation, and with mitigation, should we use carrots or sticks?

We are grateful to this informative group of scientists for the clarity they brought to our understanding of what can presently be proven scientifically about the causes of climate warming as it can be determined **settled** at the present time. The second unexpected meeting at Starr King, this one on August 24, was the Third Annual New Hampshire Climate Summit organized by the NH Network. This Network serves an important role in our State, communicating significant messages and events from the numerous nonprofit environment, energy, and climate groups with a NH presence. About 40 individuals from all over our State gathered for this meeting, successfully conducting a process that identified the projects the groups both wanted to work on together and believed to be achievable. In the months ahead your Climate Action Committee will be revealing the important details coming out of this Summit meeting. It was a thrill to be part of this gathering, and to hear all the compliments made by the participants throughout the day who were clearly in awe of our beautiful and functional Meetinghouse.

September 2024 Outreach Offering Voices Against Violence

Voices Against Violence is a local non-profit dedicated to breaking the cycle of violence by providing comprehensive services to all victims and survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking. Beyond immediate crisis intervention, they aim to create lasting change through education, advocacy, and community partnerships. Their services include:

- Shelter and housing. This includes safe emergency shelter for those escaping dangerous situations, and then helping them to access long-term, stable housing.
- Supporting children providing specialized support both practical and emotional.
- Addressing food insecurity.
- Including support for animal companions

They are launching new initiatives focused on empowering LGBTQ and differently abled survivors making significant updates to shelters and services.

Fall Bike Ride -Saturday, September 28, 2024

Nate and Janice Mulherin will lead a bicycle ride of the Northern Rail Trail on Saturday, Sep 28th from West Lebanon to the historic <u>Baltic</u> <u>Woolen Mill</u> in Enfield and back (or farther if there is interest). This ride can be done with any kind of bicycle, including an e-bike, if you don't mind going the slower to compensate for the rest of us. The first 2.6 miles of trail is paved, and the last 7.1 miles is crushed and packed gravel for a total roundtrip distance of 20.4 miles. Bring water and a lunch, and we'll stop at <u>Enfield's Lakeside Park</u> for a picnic on the shores of Mascoma Lake. Second Sunday Hike -September 8, 2024




BOOK GROUP NEWS

Our meditation group meets every Monday from 6 to 7 pm in the upstairs foyer. We are a small informal group that shares an abiding interest in meditation. Usually, we have between 5 and 10 participants. We are not affiliated with any sect or religion, however we often follow meditations in the Buddhist tradition of Thich Nhat Hanh, Jack Kornfield, Pema Chodron and the like. We generally get together at 6 for brief hellos and pertinent comments. Then a facilitator for the week will offer a short reading or discussion on a meditation topic, followed by a guided meditation, related to the topic. The meditation can be anywhere between 20 and 40 minutes. Afterward we have a short debriefing and discussion of the experience. We adjourn at 7. There is no designated leader of the group and there is no effort to persuade anyone to any point of view.
