Minister's Newsletter February 2025

It's hard to keep an open mind if you don't have an open heart. ~ Adam Grant

Our theme for the month of February is inclusion. Like the word *woke*, *inclusion* has been co-opted, twisted, and fed back to the public as something sinister. This manipulation of language causes us to become suspicious of any use of the language, in short, we close our hearts to further conversations that contain references to these words. We become close minded, understandably so. When I use the word *gay*, you think light-hearted and carefree, right? Right. The good news is that language is fluid. It is like a living thing, constantly changing and while language is always shifting, the truths at the core of our words are not so mutable.

Our hearts may be pretty beat up by the state of the world right now. Fears are rising. Betrayal and disappointment loom large. Those things we imagined we'd made progress towards are being rolled back; people are at risk. All these things may make us want to protect and hide those parts of ourselves that feel vulnerable. This response is quite reasonable, perfectly normal, and ultimately, miserable. It behooves us to be mindful of how we choose to react.

Every Sunday morning, when the worship team meets before our Sunday service, we ask, we pray, that we may be what the people need. I think this is something our wider Fellowship can do too. We can ask, is our community being what the people, both inside our Fellowship and beyond, need? Staying present in efforts to turn this around will require fortitude, wisdom, and community. It will also require that we trust others are doing their part. My friends, many people are working, just like you, to bring about a better world.

To care for the wellbeing of ourselves and others we have to do the additional work of keeping an open heart. This is my invitation to you this month, keep an open heart. Others with the same concerns as you will be well served by being welcomed into your good company. This is one of the important things we do at our Fellowship. We provide one another good, openhearted company. I invite you to engage in one additional thing this month - come to vespers (6 pm Friday, February 7th), attend a cottage meeting, join the choir, volunteer to teach religious education (no experience required all materials/lesson plans provided), introduce yourself to someone you've not yet met, attend the New to UU class (even if you're not new to UU.) All of this provides openhearted, openminded interactions that feed the common good and we need all the common good we can muster. Just one more engagement, that's all I ask.

In the meantime, February is the month of Valentine's Day, Imbolc, and of course, Ground Hog Day. It is a month where we might relish all that winter has to offer and to look with hope at the growing duration of daylight. Be of heart my friends, this story is not over, may we ever remain openhearted.


Choir will meet every Thursday in the sanctuary from 6pm-7pm, EXCEPT Thursday 2/20, when we will meet 530-630pm.

From your DRE

The start of the new year has been full of activity at the Fellowship! To kick things off, the RE committee hosted the first 'Stay and Play' time. This will be an ongoing offering once a month after the service for families with children of all ages. In this time, kids will



have access to games and art supplies and are encouraged to freely play in the RE space while parents have a chance to get to know each other better. Volunteers serve as support to the primary teacher who leads the activities. No prior teaching experience is needed, and all activity plans are provided. At the end of the month, we had a lovely intergenerational service, where folks of all ages participated in an art activity to help the Stewardship committee decorate the pledge poster. In this service, we also heard several members of the Youth Group speak about their experiences and hopes for the upcoming trip to Costa Rica. The youth are so grateful for the Fellowship's generous support in their fundraising efforts, and are excited for things that are to come!

The Our Whole Lives course continues to meet regularly at the Fellowship. We are so grateful to everyone who continues to support the OWL program. Providing comprehensive, inclusive, science-based sexuality and relationship education is one of the most effective and impactful ways the Fellowship can support youth in our community. Also this month, a group of Fellowship members gathered both online and in person to discuss strategies for active allyship and community care. In this workshop, we explored legislative and cultural threats to reproductive and trans rights in New Hampshire and nationally, brainstormed ways to engage in social justice efforts, and shared trusted resources for deeper learning. 




Great way to support SKUUF


BOOK GROUP NEWS—February

About Membership in Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship

What it Means to be a Member

Membership is open to all individuals sixteen years and older regardless of race, creed, national origin, gender or sexual orientation who are in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship.

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.

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
