
Special Stewardship Drawing, Sunday March 9!

I know that times feel quite uncertain. I know that it feels, for many, like the earth is moving beneath us, shifting in ways that leave us uneasy, suspicious, and cautious. I know. Meanwhile, I am reminded of what Mary Oliver writes in her poem, Wild Geese:

...Meanwhile the world goes on.
Meanwhile the sun and the clear pebbles of the rain are moving across the landscapes, over the prairies and the deep trees, the mountains and the rivers.
Meanwhile...

...meanwhile we live our lives working as we have always done, each in our own way. Working to bring about lives of purpose, of meaning, to bring about an expression of love, a satisfaction, a commitment to the wellbeing of all. This has not changed. I trust that. 

Some of the new selections focus on LGBTQ+ topics as part of the Welcoming Congregation renewal. Other subjects deal with grief and loss. Both children's and adult books are included.

Climate Action Committee

A program worth listening to on the radio or connecting with online is "Living on Earth" which is broadcast on NH Public Radio every Sunday morning from 7 am to 8 am. The program has been on the radio for years and I know many of you have been listening to it when you can for a long time.

During this period when so little good action seems possible regarding our changing climate, what makes "Living on Earth" so valuable is that the people being interviewed on the program have credible knowledge and experience in the subject being discussed. I'm always learning something new, interesting and helpful from listening while I'm getting ready to leave for our Sunday service. Even within a story that raises a particular alarm, these knowledgeable folks provide a full account that adds new and hopeful elements.

The subjects covered on February 23 for example:

- An in-depth account and analysis of the attempt to freeze \$20 billion of the funding of loans for clean energy projects and energy efficiency upgrades around the country, approved by Congress in 2022. I learned about the careful process by which this funding was set up, making it extremely difficult for these funds to remain frozen. Some hope here perhaps that all will not be lost.
- A conversation about why we should care about the negative financial effects of allowing emissions to continue at their current pace. - The speaker suggests that a greater focus on future negative financial outcomes likely to result from ignoring the impact of emissions may be an effective way to change some influential minds who are still enthusiastically investing in fossil fuels for the gains they offer at present and into the near future.
- A visit to the living plants and animals waiting for spring, just under the ice at Pine Hole Bog located within the Charles W.
 Ward Reservation in Andover, Massachusetts, a bog I remember visiting with great interest and pleasure decades ago.
- A reflection on civil rights and environmental justice by Rev.
 Ben Chavis, a well-known activist back in the 1980's.

The archives at loe.org are extensive and easy to explore, back to 1991. And online you get to see the students who appear to be happily engaged as they visited that bog.

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March 2025 Outreach Offering

Outreach Offering for March 2025

In 2024, we invited a guest to speak to us about the work of New Hampshire Alliance for End of Life Options (NHAEO). This group was hard at work to educate citizens about their efforts to pass legislation to give those approaching the end of life the ability to claim the right to a humane death. We provided the funds from one of our outreach offerings to support their work. The proposed bill failed by a narrow margin.

This organization opted to try again this year. A new bill has been filed – the End of Life Freedom Act, HB 254 - and first hearing was scheduled for January 29. HB254 has bi-partisan co-sponsorship and the prime sponsor is Republican Rep. Bob Lynn, Judiciary Committee chair and former state Supreme Court Chief Justice. Last year's prime, Democrat Rep. Marjorie Smith, continues as a co -sponsor. The bill is revised to clarify and strengthen some provisions but the general approach is the same as HB1283 in last session.

There are approximately 100 new members of the House, and several new members of the Judiciary Committee. NHAELO has hard work ahead. Our outreach offering will support all their education and advocacy work to help push this bill over the finish line. We are hoping to help them with the work that lays ahead. Rebecca Brown will be joining us on March 16 for an update on this update as another vote in the judiciary Committee approaches. Join us for this update to learn more.


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Great way to support SKUUF

What it Means to be a Member

Membership is open to all individuals sixteen years and older regardless of race, creed, national origin, gender or sexual orientation who are in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship.

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.

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
