Minister's Newsletter October 2024

The difference between hearing and listening is attention. ~ Ruth Messinger

Our Soul Matters theme for October is Living Love Through the Practice of Deep Listening. Attention, as suggested by Ruth Messinger, is the key difference between hearing and listening. We live in times of tremendous distraction not to mention the self-talk that rattles on and on in our own heads. (Okay, maybe just my head.) No wonder we struggle to really listen. Beyond listening to one another, this practice includes listening to silence, to a child, to nature, and to our own hearts. Regardless of what we are listening to or for, it takes practice to listen well. And so, this month, I aim to practice listening with a bit more intention and attention. Dear ones, let me know if you have concerns, ideas, or questions. I want to listen. I want to hear your stories. I hope you'll join us on Sunday mornings to explore this topic of deep listening.

Speaking of intention and attention, thank you. Thank you for all the ways you care for this Fellowship and each other. Let me highlight the Smooth Sunday teams. Your care for this Fellowship on Sunday morning makes this place feel warm and welcoming. It feels like home to me as I witness the way we take turns providing hospitality to one another. 


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SKUUF LENDING LIBRARY

We have had an active start to the church year in Religious Education. This past month we have focused on the theme of 'Invitation', engaging in a range of creative and movement-based activities to explore what Invitation means to each of us, and how we can put that into practice in our RE spaces. WHAT TO EXPECT THIS YEAR FROM YOUR CLIMATE ACTION COMMITTEE:

One or Two projects we can all engage in together With a Focus on New Hampshire

You can help the Committee determine what these projects should be. Talk to us or send an email to Nancy Chaddock or Suellen Skinner.

Possibilities:

<u>Climate Justice</u> – Supporting a community in our state being harmed by government action or inaction, such as a public landfill or by a business adding harmful pollution to the air or chemicals to the land or water.

<u>Legislative action</u> – Working with religious and other nonprofit groups in our State engaged in the process of advancing a particular bill related to climate-related matters, such as one of those bills discussed as actionable that came out of discussions sponsored by the New Hampshire Network at its 3rd Annual Climate Summit, held at our Meetinghouse on August 24th. These included a bottle bill and passing what might be required to prepare the State for carbon pricing at the national level.

<u>Working on an item closer to home perhaps</u> – Sharing what we know and want to learn more about, such as community power, heat pumps, solar power, net metering, electric cars, what homeowners in NH may expect from the New England Heat Pump Accelerator and the Inflation Reduction Act.

October 2024 Outreach Offering

The October outreach fund will be used to support the work of the New Hampshire Community Bail Fund. This fund frees people who are stuck in jail before being tried for any crime. In many cases, they are accused of misdemeanors like trespassing, shoplifting, and drug possession.

Despite being innocent until proven guilty, they are unable to get out of jail because they can't afford bail—sometimes as little as \$50. Most of the people we work with are held at Valley Street Jail in Manchester. Many need treatment for mental illness or substance use disorders, which they are often unable to receive in jail.

Since its creation in the summer of 2018, the NH Community Bail Fund has freed more than 800 people from the Valley Street Jail in Manchester and other New Hampshire jails. While the majority of the bails they pay are eventually returned to the fund once their clients' cases are resolved, it often takes 12-16 months or more to get the funds back. So they depend on supporters to help continue this work in the face of ever-increasing bail requests and slow bail returns. Just during July, 48 bails were paid. In August 65 were paid, setting a new monthly record.

The Fund:

- Provides bail for people being held in New Hampshire jails, with a focus on the Valley Street Jail in Manchester
- Collaborates with other community organizations and agencies to connect clients with services they need
- Works for an end to cash bail and the transformation of the criminal legal system
- Is a small team of unpaid volunteers
- Is a project of Unitarian Universalist Action New Hampshire
- Is part of the National Bail Fund Network.

On October 20, Mr. Paul Intracaso, from the New Hampshire Bail Fund will join us during worship to tell us more about this important work. Please join us.

What it Means to be a Member

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.
