Welcoming Congregation Sign Unveiling

The Welcoming Congregation Committee raised Starr King's LGBTQ+ Pride sign on the front entrance of our Fellowship on Sunday, January 5, 2025 as we marked our successful re-designation as a Welcoming UU Congregation.

Starr King was first designated a Welcoming Congregation in 1999 by the UUA. In 2021 they asked for all congregations to reaffirm their designation. Starting in 2023 with the help of ministerial intern Margaret Reiser our task force was formed. Through much work on the task force's part and the work of the congregation, the resolution to renew our Welcoming status was approved unanimously at the 2024 annual meeting!

In the fall of 2024 the task force chose to become a Committee as there is much work still to be done. Please contact any of the members if you have any questions and/or would like to join us in our work! Our next meeting is January 29th at 11 at Starr King. All are welcome!

Minister's Newsletter January 2025

The currency of story is not truth but meaning.

– Patrick Reinsborough and Doyle Canning

In this new year, a year many are feeling trepidatious about, we would do well to be aware of the power of stories. Both the stories we hear and the stories we tell. Each has the power to do good or to bring about ill. The power of misinformation is one example of the damage stories can do. I need not say more about that but, know that stories are necessary to bringing about good change too. This is because stories are about meaning, not truth. This is not to say that truth should not have weight or doesn't matter, it just simply means that if we're trying to change public perspective or opinion, we'd do better with a story that evokes a personal response rather than simply the facts. This is the power of our community and the stories we share with one another. In this way we affirm what is good and right.

With stories we manifest the world we want, where all are welcome and transformation is possible. Need evidence? Look at the front of our building, we now proclaim just a couple of the ways we Side with Love - with the Black Lives Matter sign and the new Welcome sign with its LGBTQ+ symbols. Here's the story, a small group of committed people came together, expressed concern, hope, and action. Then, we did the work. We listened and learned. People stepped up to explain, to help everyone understand the diversity of peoples that make up the human family and recognized their worth. It's a good and ongoing story that we now express on the outside our building so that that story can be part of a larger movement towards inclusivity, compassion, and justice. I am grateful to the Welcoming Committee for the work they did to make this possible for all of us. They did their part to perpetuate good change. Let us tell the story.

I charge you with this as we approach the new year — work at telling the stories that can bring about good change. What stories are we going to tell to continue to bring about the world we want? I know that last year was rough, hell, the last 8 years have been rough, and it may get rougher still. But the story I want to tell is one of resistance and commitment to a liberating love for all. I encourage you too, to stand on the side of love. Be a witness to the good stories all around you that provide evidence that there is reason for hope. Then, retell those stories. It is good to be in this story with you. Let us write the next chapter of our collective story already full of meaning and so much love.

I look forward to what this time collectively will call us to be, both at the Fellowship and in the larger community.



For the month of January, we are exploring the theme of 'Story'. The children have begun exploring what it means for them to write the story of their lives. This past Sunday was also our first 'Stay and Play' time - an opportunity for parents and kids to spend time together at the Fellowship after the service. It is something we plan to continue to offer to families on a regular basis. Our Youth Group has resumed meeting regularly on the first and third Sunday of each month, and the Our Whole Lives course will also start up again this week after taking a break for the holidays. It is wonderful to see so many children and youth engaging with the many things the Fellowship has to offer, and it is all thanks to the many volunteers who dedicate their time and love to the RE program.

She also made a presentation to our Fellowship years ago entitled "Thomas Starr King visits Plymouth," drawing on her extensive knowledge of the times King spent in Plymouth. Finally, I thank Kathy for lending me her precious first edition of King's book, "The White Hills" to hold during my research of King's life. I had been working with a complete copy of the book, but having that first edition close at hand was a treat.

I look forward to a time in the future when someone with a talent for writing for children, or for producing a skit perhaps in which children might participate, uses that talent to help us remember King in a joyful way.

Climate Action Committee

In the December newsletter, Nancy discussed issues we might focus on as we wait to see what the new administration brings. One issue involves landfills. The laws and rules controlling the operation of landfills has been debated for years as residents of northern New Hampshire have fought to keep out a huge new landfill whose permitting has been requested by Casella, a waste management company already managing landfills in our state.

Work continues in our government to seek protections from landfills that threaten our land and water. There have been proposed laws to protect New Hampshire from these risks. Last year, several bills were proposed, were approved by the House and shot down by the Senate. At the same time the Department of Environmental Services (DES) has been developing rules.

In case you missed it, the rules put forward by DES have been opposed by many groups as not being protective enough. However a few weeks ago, the Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules swiftly approved them without permitting any public hearing (after they received tons of comments in opposition).

As we consider ways we can become involved in issues surrounding pollution and climate change in our state, this looks like something worth learning more about. It is a good example of how our legal system works, the way big business can manipulate things, and importantly, what happens to all that stuff we take to the dump.

If this issue is one you've been following, give Suellen a call or email. This is a long, complicated struggle against big, wealthy businesses that threaten our resources and communities. Efforts to learn more will take time. The good news is that Governor Elect Ayotte says she opposes the proposed landfill in Dalton but the issue is far from settled. We will be looking for ways to be involved by advocating, writing legislature and working with other volunteers. One central non-profit who is leading the fight is North Country Alliance for Balanced Change. If you want more information, check their website. https://northcountryabc.net/



What it Means to be a Member

Membership is open to all individuals sixteen years and older regardless of race, creed, national origin, gender or sexual orientation who are in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Fellowship.

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.
