Minister's Newsletter November 2024

Our Soul Matters theme for the month of November is Living Love Through the Practice of Repair. Typically, I use the Soul Matters themes to frame the topics of our Sunday services and my newsletter offering. So, here I sit at my desk, just few days out from our national election, wondering what I might offer? Not so much, actually. We are in a time of tension and waiting. We know not yet what will need repair. We are anxious. And yet, in this moment, in this quiet space, I'm okay. I hope you are too. I've been intrigued by words of post-activist, Bayo Okomolafe, "Times are urgent, so let us slow down." This is what I might do right now. Wait, think, be quiet in the din of the election and the loud inner voice of anxiety, so that I might simply slow down. Breathe.

And then, take another breath and consider these words from author Rasheed Ogunlaru, "Compassion is even more powerful than courage. Sure, with courage you can conquer a world – but only with compassion can you heal and build it." This I can take into what's next. Compassion is what we might focus on, compassion right now rather than anxiety. I aim to make a spiritual practice of that. Compassion does not mean we agree. Compassion does not mean we aren't angry or scared. It simply means we wish to ease the suffering of others.

It is a very human and dangerous thing we do when we demonize or *other* a group of people. Be they conservatives or liberals, immigrants or the educated, urban or rural. *Othering* allows our imperfect human hearts to put those with whom we disagree outside our circle of care. It allows us care less and in doing that, we become careless. So, my invitation to myself and to you if you find it helpful, is to be mindful of that. Let us aim, always to return to our better selves.

To repair those rips and tears in the fabric of our democracy let us remember to slow down, practice compassion, and breathe. We are all in this together.

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Do you know the function of your Committee on Ministry?

Religious Education

This past month on Sunday mornings, the children, alongside the RE teachers, have been exploring the theme of Deep Listening. They practiced sitting in si-



lence, each week trying to add a little more time, as well as other mindfulness activities to help them practice tuning in to the sounds around them. Engaging in deep listening activities helps us to hear our inner voice better. It also helps us to be better listeners to one another, and therefore reach deeper levels of mutual understanding. This upcoming month, as a group we will explore the theme of Repair. We are always looking for new RE volunteers! Our Middle and High school youth groups have been meeting regularly and are organizing an Open Mic/Coffee House event for the beginning of November. The groups are discussing the details of an upcoming trip to Costa Rica and are excited to continue planning more Fellowship-wide events. We are very excited to share that the Our Whole Lives course we are offering has begun and they will continue to meet regularly until April. This course provides youth with essential, life-saving information about sexuality and relationships - subjects that in many states, including New Hampshire, are not safe for teachers to teach in classrooms due to the threat of prosecution. Offering this course at SKUUF will have a huge impact on the lives of the youth participating, and have a ripple effect in their circles of peers. In the future, we hope to be able to offer more OWL programs, to an even wider range of ages. 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Climate Action

An important Item for Our Climate Action Focus This Year: New Hampshire Climate Action Plan

In August, 2023 the Federal Environmental Protection Agency awarded a Climate Pollution Reduction grant to the NH Dept. of Environmental Services (DES) as part of the Inflation Reduction Act. The Act outlines 3 objectives

- Reduce climate pollution while supporting the creation of good jobs and lowering energy costs for families.
- Accelerate work to reduce environmental impacts to low-income, overburdened communities.
- Deliver cleaner air by reducing harmful air pollution in places where people live, work, play and go to school.

The initial development of what this Plan would contain for our State was completed by the NH DES in March, 2024, based on stakeholder engagement which was facilitated by the University of New Hampshire. The next step to be taken is the development of a NH Comprehensive Climate Action Plan by August, 2025.

The public is invited to participate in kickoff events:

- online on December 10, 2024, 5:30 pm 7 pm and
- in-person at the NH DES auditorium, 29 Hazen Drive in Concord, December 11, 2024, 8:30 – 11:30 am

A summary of the March, 2024 NH Plan includes an emphasis on sectors creating our State's greatest greenhouse gas emissions (transportation, residential buildings), energy systems, water systems, and waste reduction.

Other climate-related developments will present opportunities to us in the months ahead. In August, 2024 the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency announced a grant program that will help many New Hampshire families defray the high upfront costs of buying a home heat pump system. We can help get the word out as details become known about this grant and other incentives become available for the move away from fossil fuels.

November 2024 Outreach Offering

This month's Community outreach, on November 17th, will be for the Plymouth Area Community Closet. An organization that Starr King has continued to support throughout the years. It has been around since 1951. It has done many things through the decades but now the main work is through their financial aid office where they administer fuel assistance through the Keep the Heat On program. The Food Pantry is also open two mornings a week serving families from Plymouth and 14 surrounding towns. Their longest standing project is the Holiday Food Baskets which is done every December.

Second Sunday Hike - November 10, 2024

Join us as forest technician Amey Bailey guides us through the <u>Hubbard Brook Experimental Forest</u>, owned and operated by the US Forest Service in Woodstock/Ellsworth.



Learn how nearby small watersheds have served as an outdoor laboratory continuously measuring water and nutrient transport through forested ecosystems since 1955, and how things have changed over time. The hike is 2-3 miles with some hills and steep inclines through the south facing experimental watersheds. An exciting, moderate hike for outdoors students of all ages. 


Thanks to Bill Haust for displaying his beautiful artwork in our foyer.

What it Means to be a Member

You are invited to become a member by participating in a Path to Membership orientation or by meeting with the Minister to review the benefits and responsibilities of membership. All new members sign the official Membership Record book witnessed by the Minister or a Membership Committee Chair.

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.

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
