Finally, I hope for you a calm reserve for whatever challenges you face, that we all face. And may peace be yours this season. This is my hope for you.




## From your DRE

#### **Climate Action**

It is difficult to imagine what difficulties lie ahead with respect to action on climate change and climate *justice*, but I believe that educating ourselves and staying informed about issues as they develop in New Hampshire, should lead us to some comfort that we are "doing what we can, together." We do know there will be occasions when our UU presence at a particular time and place here in NH may be important. Preparing ourselves for those occasions is time well spent.

It is also helpful to learn the specifics of what UU's across our country are thinking of doing within their states about climate issues. Great to learn that many of you are planning to attend UU General Assembly in Baltimore in June, 2025. If you haven't considered it, please **do!** See info about GA'25 at uua.org

Here is a sampling of what we are tracking and learning about here in New Hampshire at present:

- ♦ From a NH Network Zoom meeting I attended on November 18:
  - •One speaker, a long-time rep in the NH House who has been focused on climate change for many years, stated that he and other reps are planning to introduce bills that refer to "costs" rather than "climate change" since the latter wording dooms a bill to failure at the outset.
  - •Another speaker, a NH resident representing the Center for Climate Integrity, informed us of the likelihood that a lawsuit brought by the State of Massachusetts against a major oil company may be the first court battle in the country of the type that oil companies fear the most, for what it might cost them.
- ◆Incoming Governor Ayotte may bring to the table different ideas regarding climate matters, based on past statements, downplaying offshore wind development and perhaps supporting nuclear energy. She visited Forest Lake Park in Dalton, NH, stating her strong opposition to expansion of a landfill close to the lake being sought by a privately-owned waste management company. Her opposition is shared across political lines because it would threaten not only the beauty and use of the park, but also endanger water resources with so-called "forever chemicals" and increase the amount of heavy truck traffic for residents of this rural area. Opposition also comes from the fact that presently our State allows waste from Massachusetts to be transported to this landfill.
- ♦We look forward to attending the presentation by the NH Department of Environmental Services, scheduled to be held in December, offering Federal grant money to our State for the development of a comprehensive climate action plan (see our article in the November newsletter).

A big "thank you" to whoever donated the book "A Life On Our Planet" by David Attenborough. His views are worth reading, based as they are on his extensive studies in nature around the globe for decades. Other book donations are noted with our thanks. Check the display out at your next visit to the Foyer.

Pemi Youth Center

This month's Community outreach, on December 8th, will be for the Pemi Youth Center. Julia Dunn, the director, will be speaking on behalf of the center. Here is a bit about the center from Julia:

Pemi Youth Center is a non-profit afterschool program run from 2:30 -5:30 PM Monday - Friday.

Our Mission is to provide a safe and welcoming environment where our youth may gather outside of school and gain a sense of community, belonging and self-esteem.

Founded in 1999 by Glenda Toomey, who saw a need for a safe afterschool location for youth in Plymouth considered "latchkey kids" from the hours of 2:00 - 6:00 PM. Now, celebrating 25 years in operation, we are an empowerment and enrichment program. On average, we serve 10-15 youth per day, with over 35 active registrants.

2:30 - 3:30 PM - youth arrival

3:30 PM - community circle- snack & daily briefing

3:45 PM - 15 min. of homework/reading time

4:00 - 4:45 PM - enrichment activity (varies daily)

4:45 PM - snack/Small dinner

5:00 - 5:30 PM- free play until pick-up

## Year-end Reminders from the Treasurer

### IRA Gifts for 2024

As year-end approaches we remind you that if you are 70 ½ or older and have an IRA, gifts, known as "Qualified Charitable Distributions or QCDs" transferred directly from that IRA to qualified charitable organizations, such as our Fellowship, may:

- •allow you to make a gift of pre-tax dollars, rather than an after-tax gift through a check or credit card;
- be excluded from federal income taxes since your gift would pass directly from your IRA to the Fellowship; and
- provide you with a tax savings regardless of whether you itemize or not.

#### Year End Reminders from the Treasurer

- Please remember to note on the memo line of your check what your check is for. If it is left blank, we will assume it is meant to be a non-pledge donation to the operating fund.
- Checks for contributions you wish to see included on your 2024 charitable giving statement must be postmarked or dropped off at the Fellowship by December 31<sup>st</sup>.


#### **Member News**


## **Howling Monkey Nicaraguan Coffee Still Available**

Members are entitled to the services of the Minister and the use of the sanctuary for Rites of Passage (weddings, dedications, memorial services, etc.) at no cost. Members are eligible to serve in elected officer positions and serve as committee chairs. Members have the privilege of full voting rights.

Membership is maintained by active participation in the Fellowship, by supporting the annual Stewardship Drive and/or contributing service toward the Fellowship.

#### What it Means to be a Friend

A Friend of Starr King UU Fellowship is an individual in harmony with the visions, goals and principles of our Fellowship who chooses not to sign the Membership Record Book. A Friend may participate in any and all Fellowship activities but does not receive Rites of Passage services without a fee, is not eligible to vote or serve as an elected officer or committee chair.
